2026 Action Plan



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From the CEO

When the Internet Society Haiti Chapter set out to expand Internet connectivity nationwide, they had more questions than answers. In 2019, a group of chapter volunteers attended the Haiti Internet Governance Forum (IGF) in search of those answers. It was the first step in a years-long journey to develop and implement sustainable connectivity solutions throughout the country.



Their journey culminated in helping regulators to create enabling policies, and training over 200 people to install networks. Today, the community networks they established provide Internet access to more than 9,000 people, connecting schools, fishermen, and families.

The Internet changes lives—but only when people can access it, trust it, and use it safely.

As we enter the second year of our Strategy 2030, we're building on the momentum of the bold commitments and measurable progress we made in 2025. But the stakes have never been higher. We face threats to global interoperability as governments seek to fragment the Internet along national lines. The multistakeholder model that has made the Internet a force for innovation and human progress is under pressure from those who would centralize control. And most critically, the digital divide continues to widen, leaving 2.6 billion people—one-third of humanity—without access to the opportunities the Internet provides.

These challenges demand our full engagement. We are deeply invested in defending open standards and protocols that keep

the Internet globally connected. We champion multistakeholder governance because decisions about our shared digital future must include everyone affected by them. And we're racing to connect the unconnected before advancing technologies like Artificial Intelligence leave them even further behind.

The stakes are high, but the Internet Society community is resilient and prepared. From Haiti to Mali to Nepal, Internet Society members, chapters, and partners are connecting people and working for a safer Internet in challenging environments. They understand that every encrypted connection protects someone's privacy, every Internet exchange point adds resilience to keep businesses online, and every community network unlocks opportunities for children and families.

This Action Plan, alongside the Internet Society's Action Plan, outlines how we'll advance our strategic goals in 2026. We can't do this alone—achieving an Internet for everyone requires all of us working together.

- Broaden our portfolio of Fellowship programs with the addition of new programs to our current portfolio, increasing to 8 Fellowship Programs across the Internet Society
- Reach new audiences and geographies by refining application and selection criteria of our Fellowship programs.
- Scale training initiatives by introducing more engaging and flexible formats,

- strengthening strategic partnerships, increasing collaboration with chapters, and expanding the tutor database
- Adapt training content and delivery methods to address the specific needs of key target groups, including women-led social enterprises, refugees, indigenous communities, and populations in Least Developed Countries (LDCs) and Small Island Developing States (SIDS)
- Build sustainable local training capacity by investing in technical trainer development and fostering local and regional partnerships


- **Advance** the Internet Society 2030 strategy through key partnerships and impactful philanthropic grantmaking

- Provide capacity building support for our grantees through trainings, consultations, and gatherings so that our grantee partners can strengthen their operations, resilience, and ability to deliver impact
- Run learning sessions that leverage high quality data for evidence-based decision-making during implementation of existing and new programs


- **Co-create an online safety program** with the Internet Society community that responds to local needs, challenges, and opportunities
